Pre-Arrival Checklist



Passport, Visa & Insurance

We take it your passport is in date and you know where it is! Visa- you have received it from the Consulate, if not we would recommend calling as soon as possible. You will need to have a printed copy of your insurance e-card as immigration may request to see this when you arrive to Ireland.

Medication

If you are taking medication, we recommend visiting your physician to seek advice on whether you require a prescription to use in Ireland or if you can take a supply of medication for the duration of your travels. You can find more advice via The Embassy of US website.

Phone

We recommend contacting your phone company to make sure you can either get your phone unlocked or take out an international plan. We will supply you with an Irish sim card on arrival.

Note: this Irish sim card comes with €10 credit already on it and will give you access to the <u>Three.ie</u> network: although it is your responsibility to top up from month to month. We recommend the <u>pre-pay €20 per month</u> option which provides unlimited data usage and you do not need to take out a contract.

Credit/Debit Cards

Please let your bank know that you will be using your card in Ireland. Although not totally important, we just want you to be aware that in Ireland many businesses only accept cards with Chip & Pin. We would recommend asking your bank for one if you do not already have one.

Insuring your gadgets

Although your travel insurance does provide some personal belonging cover; we recommend taking out additional insurance to cover your gadgets i.e. smartphones, tablets and laptops. You can also call your own insurance or credit card company to ask if they offer such cover.
